## Learning in class



#### **Early Years**

The topic in Early Years this term is Amazing Animals. As part of their learning, they had an amazing visit from Mags at Creature Ark. Mags talked to the children about the different animals and how we needed to help look after them this by being nice and calm and quiet. As they looked at each animal, they talked about what they looked like, what they ate and how they were different to each other. Some of the animals had fur and some of the animals had scales. Some of the animals ate meat and some of the animals ate vegetables and fruit. Mags had taught the rats a special trick where they sat on someone's shoulder and then scurried down into their basket. The children had an opportunity to touch the animals if they wanted to. Mags brought in: Monty the python, Timotina the tortoise, Matilda the snail, Winston and Herbert the rat, Rosie and Poppy the guinea pigs and Charlotte the Chilean Rose Tarantula! What an amazing experience!









#### Year 2

Year 2 have been learning about Coding in Computing this term. They started with physical computing—using the Beebots! They can now create their own instructions (known as algorithms) to direct a Beebot to a specific part of a map. They have now started to also learn about coding on a tablet. The children investigated the different tiles and what each tile makes a character (sprite) do. It's all very exciting!









#### Year 4

Year 4 have been learning about digestion and food chains. They began by looking at what digestion is and the different organs involved in the process. The children have explored the mouth and its role in the digestive process, including the teeth and how we have three different types of tooth. The children had a great time taking part in an experiment to demonstrate the digestive system. They broke crackers up into small pieces (acting as teeth) They added some water, which acted as our saliva. They then put this into some orange juice which acted as the stomach acid inside our stomachs. This lovely concoction was then squeezed through the tights which acted as the intestines. Finally, they were left with the end product of the digestive process. The smell and shape of what was created was not the nicest but its helped to gain a good understanding of the digestive system!





## In other news




### **Primary Maths Challenge**

We were able to take a team of Y5/6 pupils to take part in the Primary Maths Challenge at Sir William Robertson Academy. There were over 20 local primary schools there taking part. It was a very challenging day with logic problems, algebra and a Maths relay which sounded very intense. The children represented St John's brilliantly. We're absolutely delighted to say that they came back as the WINNERS of the entire competition! They tricked me when they got back but couldn't hide the smiles on their faces and then showed their medals and lovely plaque that they brought back for their achievements. We have some very talented Mathematicians at St John's and we're so proud of them!



#### **Scholastic Book Fair**

Thank you so much to families who attended and purchased from our book fair held during Parents Evenings. We took a total of just under £500 and this has given us back commission of £200 to spend on new books for our library and classrooms. Thank you so much for supporting the book fairs and providing us with precious funds to continue to keep our bookcases full of new children's literature



### **Mixed Football Regional Final**

You may remember in the last newsletter, we were eagerly awaiting the mixed football teams regional final in Wigan! This included a very early morning departure from St John's to get to Wigan in time for the tournament. The team performed brilliantly, finishing second in their group, before succumbing to a narrow 1-0 defeat against Wigan Athletic in the quarter- finals. The event was eventually won by Burton Albion who earned their place in the national finals at Wembley Stadium in May. We are so proud of the team for representing not only St John's, but Lincoln City with pride and fantastic sportsmanship! Thank you also to Mr Morris and Coach Danny for travelling with the team and coping 6 hours on a bus!


